† Our Sacramental Policy †

Six-month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

Baptisms: Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requires that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be active, practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If two Godparents: must be 1 male & 1 female; if one Godparent: may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Please call the rectory office. Officiate at the ceremony must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Please note: The services of the Parish Organist are used for all sacramental liturgies.

This month of October has, in recent times, been set aside by the Church as a month for reflection on human life and our call to respect its inherent dignity and sanctity. In fact, the 1st Sunday of October has been deemed “Respect Life Sunday.” In light of this seasonal character, I thought some reflection on the continuing struggle to reestablish a culture of life in our society was in order. While tracking the numbers with precision presents some difficulty, most studies would suggest that there have been some 54 million legal abortions in the United States since the 1973 Roe vs. Wade Supreme Court ruling. The Guttmacher Institute has tracked 49.3 million as of last year. Some admittedly simplistic calculation would provide the rough average of 1.2 million abortions in this country a year. Personally, I believe this number to be inaccurately low. The stories are regularly reported of clinics that openly encourage cash payment for procedures that are never officially recorded—income that is never submitted for taxation. This is the homicidal equivalent of 4000 World Trade Center attacks annually. While tragedy on such epic levels should trouble us as Americans, as Disciples of Christ it should chill us to the core. This concept rings especially true in light of the traditional teaching that the willful murder of the innocent has been regarded among the sins “that cry out to heaven for vengeance” (cf. Gen. 4:10).

I am quite aware of the sensitivities surrounding this issue. I have also witnessed firsthand both the rage of the defenders of the practice and the sorrow of the wounded hearts of women in the aftermath of abortion. So I attempt to approach this topic with sensitivity toward all the victims involved. Nevertheless, the reality remains untouched—each time this procedure is performed one person dies and at least one other suffers a wound of the soul that causes unspeakable agony. The American response to this tragic situation has been alarming. We treat the issue as a political one. Politics certainly has its place in our discussions and opinions. The heroic work of those men and women who have attempted to bring the dignity of the unborn into the legal structure of our society deserves to be praised. Yet, I would suggest that the political solution is ultimately lacking. Proponents of abortion often present the challenge that if abortion were banned in our society the result would be a surge in illegal procedures. There is a kernel of truth in this polemic. While the legal slaughter of children in our society is disgraceful, the larger problem of a culture and mores that produce the demand for such practices would remain.

As followers of Christ we should oppose injustice where it is encountered. We ought not to remain silent in the face of the greatest institutional injustice of the modern age. However, we need also be mindful that the root of this injustice is found in our cultural rejection of the Christian worldview. In the contemporary American mind the family has become a malleable construct, children are seen as commodities (if not burdens), and the intimacies of marriage have been devalued into an avenue by which potential couples become better acquainted. From this cultural embrace of the mentality, that holds all things to be disposable and resists responsibility, is born an acceptance that love and pleasure exist to make us feel good and should bring no demands or consequences upon us. Until the American culture recognizes this shortcoming, until we repent and embrace the mind of Christ, the culture of death will continue to reign. The battle may be reported in our courts or in congress, but the true struggle must be engaged in our homes, in our local communities, and in our own hearts.

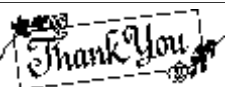
