

† Our Sacramental Policy †

Six-month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

Baptisms: Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requires that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be active, practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If two Godparents: must be 1 male & 1 female; if one Godparent: may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Please call the Parish Office. Officiate at the ceremony must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Notes of Moderation - July 26, 2024

Our Blessed Lord, before ascending into His glory, gave His disciples a precept and a challenge of evangelization. "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Mt. 28: 19-20). The Gospel, the salvific message of the salvation we have in Christ, is universal. Every man, woman, and child are to hear the "good news" and the call to come to the Redeemer of the world. They must hear of this Jesus and the promise of His love and His mercy that their hearts might begin to ponder. So that their curiosity might lead them to seek Him. That they might come to know the Christ so as to love Him, serve Him, and be glorified with Him in eternity. The instruction is clear, the methodology is where we begin to falter.

It is true, especially in our American 'multi-cultural' culture, that we have been raised with a 'live and let live' mentality. In some aspects this mentality has been good. It has taught us to strive to live among others who disagree with us in an atmosphere of relative peace and mutual respect. While the memory of religious wars and conflicts are largely a thing of the past, many of us do have memories of tensions and hostile conversation regarding the interpretation of biblical passages that have left us reluctant to engage our fellow Christians...let alone Muslims or unbelievers. We have largely become compliant in an unspoken truce of silence. This compliance has led to some major issues within our Church. Firstly, we are failing to follow the biblical instruction: "In your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect" (1 Pt. 3:15). Please take note of the 'gentleness and respect' qualifier to this instruction. Secondly, we have allowed a general spirit of indifference to creep into our thinking. I have often encountered the opinion among practicing Catholics that religious affiliation is a small matter. That people are 'just fine' as long as they follow Christ, are baptized, believe in God, or are good persons. While the Church does acknowledge that no soul is beyond the reach of salvation, the teaching has never wavered on the necessity of grace and the sacraments. In short, the further the soul is from the font of grace and mercy (i.e. The Church) the more in peril that soul would be. Thirdly, our children have largely come to absorb our attitude of indifference and developed a mentality that religious faith is of little importance. Thus, we have failed to hand on the Faith to the younger generation.

I always find it troubling when I read an article that lists problems and suggests no solutions. So, I would propose some suggestions.

First, I would suggest that we clarify for ourselves the importance of the Evangelical mandate. Some time spent with the Church's catechism and in prayer over this topic can do wonders.

Secondly, learn to speak about Jesus. We are not all called to be evangelists to far corners of the world or debate with unbelievers, but we all should be able to learn to speak about our affection for Christ. To give witness when the opportunity presents itself; to express the love of the Redeemer and the hope we have in our faith. To point to our local parish as a place of worship, reconciliation, and instruction. Even if we avoid the 'hot-button issues' we should be able to tell others that we love the Lord and rejoice in His love for us.

Thirdly, we should commit ourselves to molding the hearts of our children in devotion. Regular devotions within the home should not be uncommon in Catholic households (daily rosary? Reflections on the daily readings?) Our children must come to know the faith that is their spiritual inheritance. They should be formed in the moral foundation of the faith and beauty of Life in Christ.

The Church has taught that the home is the 'domestic cell' of Mystical Body of Christ. Instruction and moral formation are the duties of the primary teachers of the children—the parents. Nevertheless, we know the demands of modern society, and many parents feel poorly equipped to provide such instruction and formation. While, the environment and example of home life are indispensable in the formation of young Christian souls, the Church does attempt to assist in this endeavor. That is why our parishes do offer Catechism classes and St. Joseph has our local Catholic school.

When the Lumen Christi Family was initially formed, the Archbishop did express his desire that I become more involved in the school. His reasoning was straight forward. His opinion was that Catholic education was a primary tool of our evangelization efforts within the parishes and the society as a whole. A solid and genuinely Catholic education would provide a firm foundation for our youth to succeed in future academics and grow with an understanding of the treasure of our faith. In light of this instruction, I have decided to oversee and teach a supplemental religious course across the grade levels in the upcoming school year. I also intend to begin to restructure the school experience at St. Joseph to incorporate authentic Catholic devotions and foster an increased environment of Catholicity. Ideas are being presented and discussed. However, the success of the school will require support from the people of St. Joseph and the Lumen Christi family as a whole. Schools are always difficult to maintain. Teachers and staff need to be compensated, facilities need to be kept in good repair, programs and sports require equipment and coaches. When the funds are lacking (as is often the case) the parishes begin to subsidize the school and this can create a severe problem for parish finances. So, I would suggest, to all of my readers who find themselves inclined to assist in the efforts to spread the gospel and rechristen our society, to pray about assisting the school. Financial assistance is always appreciated (please contact the office), volunteer efforts are deeply appreciated as well, but if we are to bring St. Joseph school to a level of self-sufficiency, what we need are more students.

We are working diligently to provide a solid, faith based, genuinely Catholic education to the students at an affordable cost (I am told that tuition assistance is generously available). I know that entrusting your children to a Catholic school is a great act of sacrifice and trust, but I am asking the families of Lumen Christi to prayerfully consider the option. We are also exploring some possibilities for homeschoolers to participate in select programs and classes.
